

Nepal: Rambra Dari primary School in Khoka

Give the children from Khoka a new school building for the new school year! About 163 children in a very remote mountain area in Nepal go to school everyday, sometimes for more than 2 hours walking, one way! Their school in Khoka is collapsing any moment. During the rainy season their classroom floor is covered with water.

A new primary school building for 163 children in Khoka, Nepal

The school is situated in a very remote mountain area about 200 km west of Kathmandu on an altitude of 1400m. Tamsarya Foundation is our partner in this project.



School is in very bad shape

The current building is in very bad shape and has to be pulled down. During the rainy season the classroom floors are covered with water. The new building will be situated in a different location. The school already owns the land. The plan is to start with the building activities in September, after the rainy season.

If no help is coming, 163 children are deprived from their right to education

About 163 from 6 surrounding villages, sometimes have to walk for 1 to 2 hours to get to school.

A school building

The goal of this project is to provide a new school building, to allow education for 163 children to be continued.

The new building consists of 6 classrooms.



People from the village do the building themselves

The people from Khoka will do the building themselves under the guidance of a person from the Kumari school, a project of Tamsarya Foundation. They will get paid for 5 days a week (about 1 euro a day), the other 2 days they work for free. Women and men get the same wages (quite exceptional in Nepal).

How to help

The cost for the construction of the new building including 38 new school benches, materials and salaries is Euro 9.000,-



Project Partner: Tamsarya Foundation

Tamsarya Foundation realizes developing projects in Nepal. The foundation was set up by Trees van Rijsewijk and derives its name from the village where the founder lived for a year and where she witnessed the grinding poverty of the rural people. The foundation has realized its aims since 1996. The foundation aims at supporting individuals, groups and communities, especially women and children in Nepal, with a view to structural improvement.



The projects are carried out in Nepal under supervision of the director of Tamsarya's sister organisation 'Kumari Foundation', Mr. Farsu Ram Sharma.

Updated March 2006

One of the projects from Tamsarya Foundation is the Kumari School with an orphanage at the foot of the Himalayas. It is a primary school, which in Nepal means from 1 up to 5, for orphans and half-orphans and for children whose parents live far below the poverty line. On January 1st 1997 the first children arrived at this school. At present more than 100 boys and girls are living here.
