

Nepal: primary School in Atrauli

Give the children from Atrauli a new school building for the new school year! About 365 children in a very remote mountain area in Nepal go to school everyday, sometimes for more than 2 hours walking, one way! Their school in Atrauli is collapsing any moment. During the rainy season their classroom floor is covered with water.

A new primary school building for 365 children in Atrauli, Nepal

Tamsarya Foundation realises developing projects in Nepal, especially for women and children and has taken up the task to build a new school.

Pulling down of the current building can start as soon as a go ahead is being given

The plan is to start with the building activities in September, after the rainy season. The pulling down of the current building and separating still useful materials can start already before.

If no help is coming, 365 children are deprived from their right to education

About 365 children in a very remote mountain area in Nepal got to school everyday, sometimes for more than 2 hours walking, one way! Their school in Atrauli is collapsing any moment. During the rainy season their classroom floor is covered with water.

When Trees van Rijsewijk, founder of Tamsarya Foundation, our project partner for this project, visited the village, it took her 1 day by bus, half day by jeep and another day of walking to get there. She visited the almost collapsing school building and when she talked to the parents they started to cry. "So poor and no help at all", says Trees.

How to help

The cost for the construction of the new building, including materials and salaries is Euro 9.000,-

People from the village do the building themselves

The people from Atrauli will do the building themselves under the guidance of a person from the Kumari school, a project of Tamsarya Foundation. They will get paid for 5 days a week,

the other 2 days they work for free. Women and men get the same wages.

A school building

The simple goal of this project is to provide a school building, to allow education to be continued.

Tamsarya Foundation will execute the project.

Tamsarya Foundation realises developing projects in Nepal, especially for women and children. The foundation was set up by Trees van Rijsewijk and derives its name from the village where the founder lived for a year and where she witnessed the grinding poverty of the country people. The foundation has realised its aims since 1996. The foundation aims at supporting individuals, groups and communities, especially women and children in Nepal, with a view to structural improvement.

One of the projects from Tamsarya Foundation is the Kumari School with an orphanage at the foot of the Himalayas. It is a primary school, which in Nepal means from 1 up to 5, for orphans and half-orphans and for children whose parents live far below the poverty line. On January 1st 1997 the first children arrived at this school. At present 98 boys and girls are staying here.
